### FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Aug. 6th & 7th, Mary Alice Root led nine people on a trip to Sierra Blanca and Bosque del Apache NWR. They saw 40 species at Sierra Blanca including Calliope Hummingbird, Eastern Bluebird, and Red Crossbill. 30 species at Bosque del Apache including Peregrine Falcon, Double-crested Cormorant, and Burrowing Owl.

Aug. 13th, Paul Hlava led six people to Capulin Springs where they saw 30 species including four warbler species, three species of woodpeckers and a few hummingbirds.

Aug. 27th, Bob Jost led 12 people to Fenton Lake and the Seven Springs Fish Hatchery where they spotted 41 species. Highlights included Sharpshinned Hawk, Clark's Nutcracker, Pine Siskins and 6 species of warblers.

Sept. 3rd, No report on Isleta Marsh trip.

Sept. 24th, Bob Jost led approx. 20 people in two groups to Bosque del Apache NWR. They saw around 70 species including Mexican Duck, Osprey, Least Bittern and Wild Turkey.

The State Council meeting was discussed. Ross Teuber and Martin Ruoss will be our representatives for the next year. The annual assessment of 40¢ per member was sent to the treasurer of the State Council (\$192.40, 481 members).

The CNMAS has been asked by the board now administering the Audubon Wildlife Film Series to take over sponsorship of the films beginning with the 1978-79 season. It was moved and passed that we sponsor the films.

Craig Andrews reported that he could not attend the entire Environmental Education Workshop sponsored by the American Nature Study Society at Glorieta, Sept. 30th to Oct. 2nd. Craig will seek a delegate.

## LETTERS FROM LANGE

The disappearance of the hummingbirds marks the appearance of the cranes in the fall. This year we are joining the Sangre de Cristo Audubon Society in recording the Sandhill and Whooping Crane migrations. They will be flying south through October and The peak of the miearly November. gration will be in late October. The cranes leave Monte Vista NWR in the morning arriving over White Rock about noon, Albuquerque about mid-afternoon and arrive at Bosque del Apache before We need volunteers who will be available on an hour's notice to watch for the cranes. A telephone network is being set up with the Sangre de Cristo chapter and the refuges. We should have about a two-hour warning when they are spotted over White Rock. If you are free in the afternoon and care to help, please contact Dave Lange 266-4420 (office 277-3842).


# LETTERS FROM LANGE -- CONTINUED

On the 15th of October, the first Annual New Mexico Audubon Council meeting will be held in Roswell. All members are welcome to attend, please call Dave Lange for details.


