Oct. 1st, Barbara Hussey led ten people on a field trip to Shady Lakes. The usual good count included Whitefaced Ibis, Great-Horned Owl, and Baird Sandpiper.

Oct. 8th, Andy and Holly Kraynik led a field trip to Cienega Canyon. Fifteen persons participated and birds seen included the Golden-crowned Kinglet.

Nov. 5th, Dave Lange led a field trip to Bosque del Apache uplands. Eleven birders had a fine look at a Cooper's Hawk, in addition to sighting a Whooping Crane and 44 other species.

Nov. 12th, Ross Teuber also led a field trip to the Bosque. Sixteen people participated and counted 67 species of birds, including Verdin and Pyrrhuloxia.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS

During the Holiday season each year birders are engaged in taking a census of birds in assigned areas all over North America. This will be the 78th consecutive year that NATIONAL AUDUBON SOCIETY has sponsored this census and its success has been due to the participation of members and friends in great numbers.

CENTRAL NEW MEXICO AUDUBON SOCIETY is committed to conduct three bird counts, each in a different area, and we need your help with at least one of the counts. The counts last for at least eight hours. If you cannot participate for a whole day, it would be helpful if you could report at the scheduled time and participate for a few hours at least. You do not need to be an expert birdwatcher. You will be assigned to a group and other members can make identification of birds that you see. Dress for cold weather and bring your binoculars, lunch, and \$1.50 registration fee.

This is your chance to give service to the National Audubon cause while you are enjoying a day of birding with compatible friends.

CAVE CREEK CANYON, BIRDWATCHERS' PARADISE, NEEDS BIRDERS' HELP

Birdwatchers travel hundreds of miles to Cave Creek Canyon, in Arizona's Coronado National Forest, to see Mexican Chickadees, Zone-tailed Hawks, Painted Redstarts, a dozen species of hummingbirds, and Coppery-tailed Trogons (of about 25 pairs of these trogons nesting in the United States, 12 nest in Cave Creek). About 25,000 birders a year are said to visit the canyon just to see the trogons. It's a birders' paradise, but it won't be much longer if the Forest Service gives in to current pressures to give the area over to mass recreation that would destroy its natural values.

At present, the canyon has no roads, only hiking trails. Rocky Mountain Regional Representative Robert K. Turner has written to the Regional Forester, 517 Gold Avenue SW, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87102, and urged him to put the canyon under some classification that will continue to protect its natural values, and keep out roads and off-road vehicles. Birders who want to help save Cave Creek Canyon are urged to follow Turner's lead.
