


Welcome, and joyous greetings of the season! Central New Mexico Audubon Society invites you to join us. All our meetings and field trips are free and open to the public.



In 1900, ornithologist Frank Chapman and other conservationists were disturbed by the slaughter of birds in an annual Christmas event called the "side hunt." The team that shot the most birds and other small animals was the winner. As a protest and an alternative, Chapman, then editor of *Bird-Lore* magazine (predecessor of *Audubon*), organized 27 friends in 25 locations on Christmas Day, 1900, to count birds rather than shoot them. The results were published in *Bird-Lore*, February 1901: "The results of the census are both interesting and instructive . . . On the one hand the almost entire absence of such northern species as the Crossbills is noticeable; on the other, the mild season and prevailing absence of snow evidently accounts for the presence of a number of species rarely observed in December . . ." Counts that first year were held in 13 states and two Canadian provinces.

Have fun and give a special Christmas to yourself (and to the birds) by participating in one or more of the Christmas Bird Counts listed below. You'll be contributing to the collection of scientific data <u>and</u> having a good time. Amateur birders are welcomed; expert birders will be leading all groups. Our compiled information is sent to National Audubon Society and published locally in the NMOS bulletin, and next fall in National Audubon Field Notes. A fee of \$5 per participant is charged to cover cost of publication So grab your field guides, dress warmly, bring food and hot cocoa, and come celebrate Christmas the Audubon way!






## FESTIVAL OF THE CRANES -A REPORT BY JEFF MYERS, PRESIDENT


I was one of the fortunate Albuquerque residents who escaped to Bosque del Apache on Friday afternoon, just before the big snow storm hit the city. Just as three years previously, the weather pattern stopped just north of Socorro.

On Friday night, a wonderful talk (including a striking video presentation) was given by Kent Clegg, the person orchestrating the ultralight-led flight of a flock of immature sandhill and whopping cranes to the Bosque from Idaho. Three of the immature whoopers have survived and are in the company of a 15-year-old adult at the Bosque (the fourth having become dinner for a coyote a few days before the Festival). It appears unlikely that the ultralight project will be used to establish a new flock at the Bosque, but rather will be used to reestablish a flock on the East Cost (wintering in Louisiana).

The New Mexico Audubon Council tent was staffed by the following volunteers: Jonalyn Yancey (Edgewood, volunteer organizer); Ken Stinnett (Las Cruces); Donna Thatcher (Albuquerque); Sei Tokuda (Albuquerque); May Tokuda (Albuquerque); Tamie Bulow (Denver); and Jeff Myers (Albuquerque).

The best sightings on our pond at the southwest corner of the Marsh Loop were arguably a Common Loon and a Verdin. Thanks to the council volunteers for helping staff another wonderful festival!





## TRIP REPORTS - Charlotte Green

September 9-10 - Vermillion Cliffs. The long drive was worth the sighting of three California Condors. Some were in the air being harassed by Ravens. They made the Ravens look the size of flies in comparison.

September 27 - HawkWatch and Quarai. Seventeen of us braved the cold and the clouds at the HawkWatch site. We saw a few hawks fly by, but the best part was getting long close looks at Sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks before they were released. On the way back to the cars we saw a flock of Band-tailed Pigeons. Quarai was beautiful and a lot warmer. We spotted Orange-crowned Warblers, Chipping Sparrows, Lazuli Bunting, and a Porcupine.

October 25 - Bosque del Apache. This place is never disappointing. Thirteen of us had a great day seeing lots of Hawks (Red-tailed, Rough-legged, Harrier, Prairie Falcon), lots of Ducks, Geese and Cranes (although we didn't get a glimpse of the Whoopers), Ibis, Goldfinch, Sparrows and Pipits. The Coyotes checked us out, and there were Burrowing Owls in Socorro. Of course, there were owls at the Owl Bar afterwards. It turned a little cold and windy in the afternoon, but we had a wonderful day, spotting 63 bird species.

November 9 -Santa Fe. Eight people braved the weather to try to find the Rosy Finches. No luck, though -- saw Juncos, Titmouse and Chickadees instead!

# SEEN ANY BANDED BURROWING OWLS?

The Canadian Wildlife Service has been banding Burrowing Owls in Saskatchewan. Each bird wears a U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service metal band plus some combination of color bands. Observers are asked to note the colors and exact sequence of all bands. The colors used in recent years are red, yellow, green, black and white. It is important to note which leg carries particular color(s) (and it may be three colors); and, where used together, whether the color band is above or below the metal band. Should you encounter one of these birds, please report your observation, including as much information as possible, to:

# NEW SANCTUARY DONATED TO NAS

Mrs. Jean D. Shehan of Talbot County, Maryland, has donated one of the largest remaining undeveloped parcels of land on Chesapeake Bay to National Audubon. The 953-acre site, known locally as Wells Point Farm and situated in the heart of the Eastern flyway, includes eight miles of frontage on the Chesapeake Bay and provides vital habitat for migratory birds. Mason and Jean D. Shehan were honored by Talbot Co., MD, and staff and volunteers from the nearby Pickering Creek Environmental Center, owned and managed by the Chesapeake Audubon Society, are already organizing educational programs for schoolchildren and conducting a natural history inventory of the site.

#### COUNCIL CORNER

The New Mexico Audubon Council met in Santa Fe on October 25, 1997, at the Randall Davey Audubon Center. John Flicker, President of the National Audubon Society, was present for the festivities and gave a brief talk on the state and future of the National Audubon society ("National"). He reported that changes were going well to implement the strategic plan which was developed in 1995. One of its primary missions is to make National a more bottom-up organization and so more responsive to the members and the individual chapters. National will continue its emphasis on good science, under the directorship of Frank Gill, who is himself an ornithologist. National has teamed with the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology to work on a year-round way to share and input bird count information over the Internet.

Other issues covered by the council include: First, the effort to pass a "herp" bill failed due to the control of Senator Jennings over the Senate calendar during the final days of the last legislative session. We must now wait another year to bring the bill up again. Second, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish is conducting an investigation into whether the Lesser Prairie Chicken should be listed as an endangered species in the state of New Mexico. Third, the council is considering the development of a state list of Important Bird Areas in conjunction with other organizations around the state focusing on birds. Finally, the council elected new officers, who are Tom Jervis, President; Steve West, Vice President; Earl Harvey, Treasurer; and Jeff Myers, Secretary. A date and place have not yet been set for the next council meeting.




