### Herps Success!



LEAPIN' LIZARDS! Everyone: Dance around the house. The Governor signed the Herp bill Friday, March 16, and it is now law. We did it!!! After six years, it's good to celebrate a victory for the protection of our state's natural resources. Thanks to ALL, and in particular to Rep. Ray Begaye and Sen. Michael Sanchez for their sponsorship and to the Department of Game and Fish for their endorsement. Thanks also to Dennis Miller, Professor at Western New Mexico University in Silver City, and to Charlie Painter, Herps expert with the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, for making us aware of the problem and its significant extent.

The bad news is that the bill was amended on the Senate floor by Senator Pat Lyons of Cuervo in eastern New Mexico. His amendment exempts Rattlesnake Roundups, Lizard Races and fish bait from the act. The concern is that "fish bait" is not defined and if interpreted broadly could really weaken the intent of the bill. Of course, what it meant to address is the use of Tiger Salamanders for fish bait.

Our present understanding from David Henderson, State Director for the National Audubon Society, is that the Department will be creating a committee to investigate how best to implement the law and what species are in most need of immediate attention. David will likely be on that committee, and we will keep you posted on its activities. But for now, hiss, hiss, hooray!

Not Just Another Birding Trip!

Spring is here – it must be time to Birdathon!
Not your ordinary birding trip, this is a chance to go in the field – in spring, in New Mexico, during the height of migration – with experienced birders, hone your identification skills, and apply all that new information you just learned at the Audubon Birding Academy... of course, it's fun! 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### Audubon Field Trip Schedule Spring and Summer 2001

Saturday, April 7 - Bosque del Apache

This is the first full weekend that the seasonal road at the refuge will be open to the public. The target birds will be the migrating shorebirds. This trip will be lead by Art Arenholz. Meet at 7a.m. at the UNM Physics Department parking lot on the corner of Lomas and Yale Blvd for a full day of birding. Bring lunch, water, sunscreen, etc. Call Art (298-1724) or Sei (266-2480).

Saturday - Sunday, April 21-22 - Fort Sumner, Roswell and Mescalero Sands(?)

Fort Sumner is noted for its presence of Red-headed Woodpeckers and Blue Jays. Bitter Lake near Roswell is noted for its shore birds. Upland Sandpipers are sometimes seen near the refuge. CNMAS has put a request with the personnel at the BLM office in Roswell for access to the Lesser Prairie Chicken booming grounds. The decision was not available at press time. We will overnight in Roswell. Meet at 7a.m. on Saturday, April 21, at the Four Hills Shopping Center parking lot, a bit east of Central SE and Tramway NE. Call Sei (266-2480) for details before April 10 and Beth (898-8514) after April 11 (this will also be a Birdathon trip).

Saturday, May 5 or Sunday, May 6 - Sandia Mountains This will be a half-day trip to seek out the returning migrants in the Sandias. The exact site(s) will be determined on that. Bring comfortable dress for the unpredictable weather in the mountains. Meet at the Four Hills Shopping Center parking lot at 7a.m.. Call Sei for details.

Sunday, May 27 - Socorro, Water Canyon and Bosque del Apache

This is our annual 100-bird count day. It will be a full day of birding and will end at 5p.m. or whenever we record 100 species for the day. Meet at the UNM Physics Department parking lot at 6:30a.m.

Saturday, June 2 - Water Canyon

This is the date for the annual **Water Canyon Bird Count** conducted by Jim Black. Anyone wishing to participate in this count should be at the camp ground at 7a.m. Those wishing to camp out on Friday may want to join Jim for owling. Call Sei for details.

September 15-16 - Maxwell, Raton, Sugarite State Park Plans are being made to meet with Dave Cleary for a full weekend of birding in the NE part of NM. Call Sei for details in late May or early June.



## Audubon Field Trip Reports

### Saturday, February 3: Las Vegas NWR

Eight birders made this trip on a cold but clear day to Las Vegas, NM. The first bird seen was a beautiful Prairie Falcon off I-25 on the road to the refuge. It began to become better as we had beautiful sightings of Ferruginous, Bald and Rough Legged Hawks and a Merlin. Surprisingly, there were very few Kestrels and only 3 Horned Larks. The usual number of waterfowl were seen including the Common Goldeneye. The trip on to Maxwell NWR was cancelled because of snow packed roads on the refuge.

### Saturday March 10: Monticello Point and points south

This trip was led and organized by Rebecca Gracey who provided a map and an approximate timetable for the day. There were 19 birders in all. Although it was windy, at least 50 species were seen. The most notable birds were the Bald Eagles, Herring Gulls, a White Pelican, and a Prairie Falcon.






# More Field Trips International Migratory Bird Day


## President's Ponderings By Beth Hurst-Waitz

## Hummingbird Connection ...


is humming under the guidance of our new statewide coordinator,

The New Mexico Hummingbird
Connection began in 1994 as a five-year
project of the New Mexico Audubon Council and Randall
Davey Audubon Center. Phase I concluded in 2000 and
was a stunning success. Eleanor Wootten was the project's
dedicated volunteer coordinator for those five years. She
and the project's many volunteers shared the enthusiasm
and hard work to fulfill the Mission Goal of the study to
learn when, where, and which hummingbirds occur in
New Mexico; to encourage people interested in the biology
of these and other migratory birds to learn more about
their feeding, nesting, and habitat requirements; and to
promote appreciation, understanding, and conservation
of hummingbirds in New Mexico.

The project's 26-page cumulative report is itself a New Mexico treasure and can be obtained from Randall Davey Audubon Center or CNMAS. It features New Mexico hummingbird maps and hot spots, a list of favorite hummer plants, and more.

Phase II of the project already enjoys funding from the Share With Wildlife program – and is sure to be another success story under



### The Hummers Are Here!

Hummingbirds return to the Albuquerque area as early as late March – so be prepared! The safest, purest nectar you can make is 1 part table sugar to 4 parts water. Bring the water to a boil, add the sugar, and boil for 3-5 minutes. Cool before serving. Store excess nectar in the fridge up to 2 weeks. Remember to clean the feeder with soapy hot water at each refill and to rinse well. Never offer honey, artificial sweeteners, or red food coloring!

### Some neat hummingbird facts:

- \* The "humming" in their name comes not from the bird's voice, but from the whir of its wings as they beat 70 to 80 times a second and up to 200 times during a dive.
- \* Those fast wingbeats enable them to reach speeds up to 60 miles an hour.
- \* That's not the only fast thing about them a hummer's heart beats about 1,260 times per minute.
- \* They can fly forward, backward, shift sideways, and stop in mid-air.
- \* They are the world's smallest bird, with an egg about the size of a pea.
- \* 15 species of hummingbirds have been verified in New Mexico!
