#### What's in a newsletter?

Paper, Ink, Postage and Money. Our Burrowing Owl is published 4 times a year and it is the single most expensive item in our chapter's budget. But more than this, it is the single most wasteful item in our chapter's behavior. We are shepherds of our environment and the wildlife that inhabit it, yet we are still producing a paper newsletter rather than embracing the many methods available to us to communicate our message today. E-NEWS is what we should be striving for! We should be producing the Burrowing Owl without paper and without ink and without the huge costs this small chapter must squeeze out of its budget. It is the digital age and CNMAS needs to join it to remain a viable and cost-effective chapter. The thousands of dollars we now spend annually on our newsletter could be earmarked for EVEN MORE conservation work, MORE student and teacher grants, and MORE awards for youth Science Fair winners – winners who are the future of global conservation and wildlife education. Our chapter is involved in many important conservation and education projects already, just imagine what we could do if we no longer had outrageous printing costs – think of the work we could do and the young lives we could touch.

The Rio Grande Nature Center (RGNC) is probably one of the most well-known birding spots in Albuquerque. It's the perfect place to slip away from the busy work week to get that "birding fix" we all need so badly, and more than that it is an Important Bird Area and an environmental education center for kids. But did you know that the RGNC, and adjacent Candelaria Wetlands, is the site for an important project that is restoring native grasses and other vegetation to the middle Rio Grande Valley? And did you know that the money for this project is coming from us at CNMAS? We have big plans to restore all of the vegetation around this Important Bird Area and to create a shorebird pond that is accessible to the public, but these projects require money. If we were able to convert most of our membership to E-NEWS we would have extra money in our budget to help make these ideas become reality.

However, CNMAS' dollars aren't just helping to restore habitat in the Albuquerque area. We are teaming up with the NM State Land Office and a private cattle grazer to take charge of restoring and re-vegetating the Melrose Migrant Trap in eastern NM. The Trap is one of the most important stop-over sites in NM for migratory songbirds and we will need dollars to make this vision a reality – some of those dollars can come from our budget simply by reducing our use of paper in our newsletter project. These are but two of the major projects CNMAS is working on that could use additional funding. Now, you might be asking yourself how I will get my Burrowing Owl if we don't print it and mail it to you. Well, it's digital! You can receive the whole newsletter and additional bonus pages ONLINE with the click of a button! Our digital version of the Owl is expanded to as many pages as we want because it doesn't cost more to produce more pages, more information, and more fun for our members in the digital news. It's a win-win! All you need to do is tell us at the next CNMAS program you attend that you want to change to E-News, or you can e-mail Raymond VanBuskirk at

CNMASPresident@gmail.com and tell him to make the change for you. It's that simple! And, if you really need to have a printed copy, go ahead and print your copy out at home. It looks just as good as if we did it ourselves and you can print it in color! What if you don't have a computer? Well, we realize that everyone doesn't have a computer, even today in this electronic age. Do not worry. We will assure you a paper copy of the e-news in your mail if you have no other way to get the Owl. We definitely don't want to exclude you, or for you to miss out on important news from CNMAS. #### **Cats Indoors!**

CNMAS is working to reduce the impact of free-roaming cats on wildlife. Cats Indoors Committee believes that first we must become a nation of people who care for their companion cats indoors so they do not contribute to the ever growing feral cat population. Albuquerque Animal Welfare & CNMAS want companion cats kept safe at home! The City's Heart Ordinance ask owners of cats to keep the cat confined to their property at all times, either indoors or inside a secure fence. The simplest way to keep your cat safe at home is to keep the cat indoors. There are many reasons cats should be kept safe at home indoors. The behavior that makes cats so much fun as pets, the playful kitten-like behavior, is retained by cats that are kept indoors. Cats that roam free encounter many dangers like cars, angry neighbors or hungry coyotes. Cats that roam free can also bring home diseases like plague and Hanta Virus, both carried by fleas that live on rodents. The Cats Indoors Committee has found one way to reduce free-roaming cats is to educate people about cat care and the City Ordinance. We looked at the challenge the city faced in enforcing the Ordinance: even with a "Spay, Neuter & Microchip" program they are still confronted with cat overpopulation and cat abandonment. The Committee has produced two educational brochures about companion cat care which they are donating to the City for their adoption program and for Animal Control Officers. Both brochures use information from the Humane Society of the U.S. and the American Bird Conservancy about cats, with links to cat-proof fencing and cat enclosures. These brochures offer solutions for cat owners who want to bring their cat in, underscoring what is most important, which is to spend time with the cat. TO CHECK FOR POSSIBLE TRIP CANCELLATIONS DUE TO BAD WEATHER, go to the Audubon website: www.newmexicoaudubon.org/cnmas. Click on FIELD TRIPS, then go to THURSDAY BIRDERS.

DECEMBER 5 - Hike in the Manzano/Four Hills Open Space with Rebecca Gracey: 505-242-3821, maryrebeccagracey@gmail.com, followed by a holiday potluck at the home of Cindy and Joe Harris. Meet at 10:00 a.m. at the trailhead at the end of Stagecoach Road on the east side of the Four Hills Community for an easy one-mile walk. To reach the area drive one block east of Tramway on Central, turn south on Four Hills Drive, then proceed east and south on Stagecoach until it ends at the Open Space. After the walk the group will attend the potluck. Soup, coffee and tea will be provided. Everyone else should bring other dishes and beverages to share with the group. Unwrapped gifts for the Toys for Tots program will be collected from those wishing to contribute. Directions to the potluck location will be handed out at the hike. DECEMBER 12 - Hike the Ellis Trailhead followed by a drive to the Crest to view the Rosy-Finches in the Sandia Mountains with Lannois Neely: 505-890-7881, Ifneely@aol.com. Meet at 8:50 a.m. for a 9:00 departure from the parking lot on the far west side of the Four Hills Shopping Village located on the south side of Central Avenue between Tramway and Juan Tabo. The group will carpool to the Sandia Mountains. After walking about a mile on the Ellis Trail the group will drive to the Crest House for lunch and viewing of the Rosy-Finches as they come to the feeders. A \$3 parking fee or Federal pass is required per car. For those not driving the shared gas expense is \$3 at five cents per mile. The trip will end in the early afternoon.

This 570-acre area is the Price's Dairy property that was recently made an urban refuge. To carpool meet behind the Hawthorne Suites on Gibson SE, just west of University Boulevard at 8:50 a.m. for a 9:00 departure. The refuge is about 4 miles south of Rio Bravo SW on 2nd Street just south of Lagunitas Lane. The group will drive down the roads of the refuge with many stops along the way. The trip will end before noon.

Notice that this parking lot is east of the usual meeting place for the Thursday Birders. Everyone participating will do little walking since the areas being covered are the east mountain communities north and south of I-40, and will be accessed by car with many stops along the way. Spotting scopes are welcome, and bring lunch since the group will be counting birds until 2:00 p.m. Meet back at O'Niell's Irish Pub located at 3301 Juan Tabo NE, north of Candelaria, at 5:00 p.m. for the compilation party where one may purchase dinner. The event will end around 6:30 p.m.

#### CNMAS Education Grant Report- Friends of Whitfield

I have forwarded this article to illustrate our use of the \$239.40

grant we received last spring. We did not receive the Sibley's guides in time to use them during the 2012-2013 school year, but with the beginning of the 2013-2014 school year, the guides are in use. As my grant application stated, we use Sibley's Field Guide to Birds of Western North America in 4th grade classrooms in which students measure their wing span, and based on that measurement, study a bird with identical wing span. Students learn a



lot about their birds, including where the birds live each season and whether they are likely to see their birds when they visit Whitfield. Students become very engaged with the Sibley guides and are always disappointed when we collect them to use with the next class. So our CNMAS grant allowed us to purchase an additional set of 10 Sibley's which we can now leave with the teacher to use in the classroom for a week after our visit. 

### National Wildlife Refuges Support Over 35,000 Jobs, Pump \$2.4 Billion into Local Communities Banking on Nature Report Finds Refuges Continue to Be Powerful Economic Engines

MINNEAPOLIS, MN – America's national wildlife refuges continue to be strong economic engines for local communities across the country, pumping \$2.4 billion into the economy and supporting more than 35,000 jobs, according to a new national report released today by U.S. Secretary of the Interior Sally Jewell. The report, released during a visit to the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge, comes on the heels of last week's major speech outlining her conservation vision for the country and unveiling an ambitious youth initiative.

"Our National Wildlife Refuge System is the world's greatest network of lands dedicated to wildlife conservation, but it is also a powerful economic engine for local communities across the country, attracting more than 46 million visitors from around the world who support local restaurants, hotels, and other businesses," said Jewell. "In addition to conserving and protecting public lands for future generations, the report shows that every dollar we invest in our Refuge System generates huge economic dividends for our country."

The peer reviewed report by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS), Banking on Nature, finds refuges contributed an average \$4.87 in total economic output for every \$1 appropriated in Fiscal Year 2011.

"This study shows that national wildlife refuges repay us in dollars and cents even as they enrich our lives by protecting America's natural heritage and providing great recreation," said FWS Director Dan Ashe. "That's inspiring and important news, especially as our economy continues to gain strength."

The National Wildlife Refuge System is the largest network of lands in the nation set aside for wildlife, with 561 national wildlife refuges – at least one refuge in every state – covering more than 150 million acres.

Wildlife-related recreation fuels much of this economic contribution. The National Survey of Fishing, Hunting and Wildlife-Associated Recreation, which informs the Banking on Nature report and is published every five years by the Service, found that more than 90 million Americans, or 41 percent of the United States' population age 16 and older, pursued wildlife-related outdoor recreation in 2011, and spent nearly \$145 billion.

Among other key findings from the USFWS Banking on Nature report:

Spending by refuge visitors generated nearly \$343 million in local, county, state and federal tax revenue; National wildlife refuges are seen widely as travel-worthy destinations: 77% of refuge spending was done by visitors from outside the local area; and

The combined economic contribution to communities nationwide is almost five times the \$492 million appropriated to the Refuge System in FY 2011.

Refuges showing standout economic returns or jobs include:

Laguna Atascosa National Wildlife Refuge in Texas, where recreational visitors produced nearly \$30 million in economic effects on a budget of \$801,000 – roughly \$37 for every \$1 in budget expenditure; Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge in Oklahoma, where recreational visitors support 1,053 jobs and produced \$174 million in economic effects on a budget of \$3.9 million – about \$44 for every \$1 in budget expenditure; Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge, spanning Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois, where recreational visitors generated \$226 million in economic effects on a budget of \$4.9 million – about \$46 for every \$1 in budget expenditure. The refuge also supports the greatest number of jobs of all sampled refuges at 1,394 jobs; and Kenai National Wildlife Refuge in Alaska, where recreational visitors supported an estimated 907 jobs and produced \$106 million in economic effects on a budget of \$3.9 million – about \$27 for every \$1 in budget expenditure.

The Southeastern region of the U.S.— with the most refuges and many popular attractions, such as Okefenokee National Wildlife Refuge (GA), J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge (FL), and Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge (NC) — had the most visitors of any region — more than 12.4 million in FY 2011. The Southeastern region also generated the most combined jobs of any region: 9,455.

The Banking on Nature report used 92 national wildlife refuges for its economic sampling. Daily per-person spending data were drawn from the National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife-Associated Recreation and the Service's Refuge Annual Performance Plan (RAPP) for FY 2011.

Researchers examined visitor spending in four areas - food, lodging, transportation and other expenses (such as guide fees, land-use fees and equipment rental). Local economies were defined as those within 50 miles of each of the 92 refuges studied. The national estimate was reached by extrapolating results for these 92 refuges to the Refuge System as a whole.

#### The Basics of Bird Identification – for Beginning and Intermediate Birders
