

Winter Weekend Field Trips

Percha Dam and Caballo Lake

Sunday, January 6

Join Kim Score for a trip down to Sierra County to visit the Percha Dam and Caballo Lake State Park areas, located 2.5 hours south of Albuquerque. We will be birding both parks, and depending on level of interest we may also visit other nearby

hot spots at Elephant Butte Reservior. In addition to a variety of wintering waterfowl, we are likely to find a few interesting Zonotrichia sparrows, gulls, loons and mergansers. Phainopepla and pyrrhuloxia are residents here, and rare species such as purple finch and Lawrence's goldfinch could also be possible. Bring your spotting scope, camera and walking shoes, along with a day pack with water, snacks and lunch. Meet at 8:30 a.m. at the Percha Dam State Park entrance near the pay station kiosk. Please contact Kim at <u>firefinch@</u> usa.net to RSVP and with specific questions. Also, let her know if you're interested in carpooling from Albuquerque. Camping is available at both parks, and hotel accommodations can be made on Saturday night in Truth or Consequences, 20 miles to the north. It's a great time of year to warm up in the local hot springs!

Ladder Ranch Tour Discounts Offered

Near Truth or Consequences, the area includes Las Animas Creek, an Audubon Important Bird Area, where spring and summer residents include Common Black Hawks, Zone-tailed Hawks, Peregrine Falcons, Elf Owls, Yellow-billed Cuckoos and others. The ranch's Chihuahuan Desert grasslands are home to Horned Larks, Cassin's Sparrows, Black-throated Sparrows and Burrowing Owls.




Maxwell NWR

Conservation Corner

With the midterm election behind us we will soon have several new faces in public office. We are hopeful that we will find receptivity among local, state and federal officials to conservation matters of importance to our membership.

One issue that has been a longstanding concern is the condition and status of the Melrose Woods migratory trap in Roosevelt County, one of Audubon New Mexico's priority Important Bird Areas (IBA). Many of you have been amazed at the diversity of warblers and other migrants it attracts. Unfortunately, the site has been degraded by wildfire and misuse in recent years. We believe that conditions may be right for an effort to restore and secure Melrose Woods for the future through engagement with the land commissioner, the leaseholder and other stakeholders, with the support of Audubon New Mexico. 🎇 One of our members, Susan Chaudoir, has brought to our attention an urgent conservation concern in Albuquergue: an application by a developer to build 73 homes on the historic Poole estate at the end of Namaste Road east of Coors Boulevard. This property sits directly above, and connects to, the San Antonio Oxbow, a 60-acre wetland across the river from the Rio Grande Nature Center State Park. The Oxbow is important habitat for a variety of waterfowl and migratory passerines, and this development would be a major disturbance. The City of Albuquerque's Environmental Planning Division will hear the application on December 13, 2018, at 8:30 a.m. at Plaza Del Sol, 600 Second Street NW. Members, especially those who live on the West Side, are encouraged to attend. Neighborhood associations and individuals have submitted comments in opposition. Conservation Action Tip: 'Cides

Pesticides, from a wild bird rehabilitator's perspective:

I would like you, I mean you personally, to think about the consequences of our dependence upon 'cides. Pesticides, including insecticides, herbicides and rodenticides, are all chemical compounds intended to kill some form of life.

I could remind you that the insecticide spray accumulates through the food chain. The dying bug is eaten by a songbird, which is eaten by a Cooper's Hawk.

Or I could tell you that some studies have found that 90 percent of raptors test positive for rat poisons.

I could remind you that the EPA allows commercial and agricultural interests to broadcast chemical 'cides that are deemed too dangerous for sale to the public. Unfortunately, there is very little application oversight or research on the effects. Or I could simply invite you to sit with me as I attempt to ease the suffering of a Raven having terminal convulsions because he's eaten the poisoned corn intended to kill pigeons. Or at another moment when I'm trying to save the life of a majestic Red-tailed Hawk that is currently reduced to lying on her side, gasping for breath, unable to move. The bewildered bird looks into my eyes as a trickle of blood escapes her mouth. In the absence of trauma, that is a tell-tale sign of death by rodenticide. You will remember the experience and be changed.

So, choose a non-toxic garden spray.

Try a wasp trap that attracts and drowns rather than poisons.

Use snap-traps for rodent control, never ever baits.

Question what the maintenance worker is spraying where your kids play.

The soul you save may be your own.

Winter Climate Watch Surveys

The slogan for National Audubon's science-based climate change initiative is "It's Time to Give a Flock." Audubon citizen scientists from across the country will once again fan out and conduct five-minute point counts of bluebird and nuthatch species between January 15 and February 15.

CNMAS volunteers, coordinated by Judy Liddell, have been participating since the initiative's inception in 2016. "We have not expanded into Socorro County or southern Torrance County and would welcome volunteers interested in surveying in those areas," said Liddell.

Individual volunteers, or teams of two or three, pick one day during the four-week period to conduct their 12 point counts, tallying all birds seen or heard, in addition to their target species of either bluebirds or nuthatches, and then entering their tallies into eBird.

DECEMBER 6

Walk along through the bosque from the Paseo del Bosque, Shining River Access Point, followed by a holiday potluck, with Rebecca Gracey: 505-362-5095, <u>maryrebeccagracey@gmail.com</u>. Meet at 10:00 a.m. in the parking lot located directly south of Paseo del Norte on the west side of Rio Grande Boulevard. If coming from the east or west sides of town, there is no exit from Paseo del Norte to Rio Grande.

After the walk, the group will go to the nearby home of David Watkins and Maxine Schmidt. Directions will be handed out after the walk. The hosts will provide soup, and the guests should bring other dishes and beverages to share with the group. The lunch should end by 2:00 p.m.

DECEMBER 13

Feathered Dreams: a Book Review

Feathered Dreams, a book of poems, stories and images by CNMAS member Janet Ruth, captures the souls of the birds that frequent her Corrales garden, as well as those she studied as an ornithologist and some of the exotic birds she encountered on her international travels.

Who could resist a poem titled "Wheet, Wheet," which describes the antics of a Curve-billed Thrasher? The journal essay "Living With Otis" chronicles a year in the life of a Western Screech Owl and its offspring that took up residence in her yard, providing a rare glimpse into the life of a small owl that most of us can only glance at. Ruth's essay "When I Stop Counting" reminds us what we discover when we stop to observe a bird's behavior, rather than just tick it off our list.

This book will bring us closer to the wonders of nature.
