# Christmas Bird Counts: the Show Must Go on

## Pandemic Guidelines

Most of you are probably familiar with the Christmas Bird Count (CBC), Audubon's annual tradition for 121 years. If you are not, there is a great introduction on the Audubon web site: see the link in the box opposite.

As always the count will be Dec. 14 through Jan. 5. This year, however, is different due to the pandemic. National Audubon has given CBC compilers two options this year:

Option 1: Run a COVID-19 safe and socially distanced CBC, if local rules allow.

Option 2: If option 1 is not possible, cancel this season's CBC for your location.

## Albuquerque Count

I have chosen Option 1, and the date for the Albuquerque count is Sunday, Dec. 20—BUT please check for updates.

We will make the following changes to our usual practices:

1. There will be no compilation or tally gathering at the end of the day, and the final results will be e-mailed to all participants.

2. Counts must be submitted to the compiler via eBird checklists: <u>https://ebird.org/home</u> by sharing them with the "official" Albuquerque CBC eBird count.

3. Participants will be expected to go out singly or in small, socially-distanced (and masked!) groups and to follow all health and safety protocols. For up-to-date information on Christmas Bird Counts in our area use the link under Events on our chapter's home page:

## National Wildlife Refuges

Central New Mexico's national wildlife refuges have closed their visitor centers and cancelled programs for the duration. Details are available from <u>www.fws.gov/refuges</u>. Telephone numbers listed below are for weekdays only.

#### Valle de Oro

Access to the refuge is now limited to walkers, horseback riders and bicyclists. Cars may be parked at the Welcome Center. Dogs on leashes no longer than six feet continue to be allowed.

This change in access allows refuge managers to protect wildlife and their habitat as it is being restored while also accommodating recreation.

The refuge staff is exploring ways to accommodate visitors with disabilities. Questions or concerns may be addressed to <u>vdolistens@fws.gov</u> or (505) 248-6667.

#### Bosque del Apache

As of Nov. 7 the refuge's visitor center and nature store are closed, as are restrooms and vault toilets. No drinking water is available.

Most tour routes are open during daylight hours. The on-line nature store is open.

#### Sevilleta

Trails are open. Trail maps and a guide to the



refuge's wildflowers may be downloaded from the website. (505) 864-4021.

## Rio Grande Nature Center

## Sandia Ranger District
